100 Years of 4-H in Otsego County

4-H in Otsego County began in 1925 and was originally called Boys' and Girls' Club. The following year, Mr. Lester V. Benjamin was hired to work with 4-H in Otsego, Cheboygan and Montmorency Counties. Financial backing for county club work was provided by the Gaylord Chamber of Commerce. 5 potato and 6 canning clubs were started for summer programs. Sewing, handicraft and hot lunch were started for the winter months.





SNAP-ED Programming

Community Nutrition Instructor Jane Sherry enjoyed teaching a variety of nutrition programs in Otsego County:

- Adults learned about healthy cooking, meal planning and budgeting, and food safety.
- Youth learned about MyPlate, nutrition and the importance of physical activity.



Improving Outdoor Play Environments

MSU Extension partnered with Gaylord Head Start to improve their outdoor play and learning environment for preschoolers as a part of a PSE effort.

A \$1500 SNAP-Ed PSE mini grant was used to purchase portable play equipment such as balls, balance beams, scooter boards, tunnels, jump ropes and more.

Preschoolers will have access to this inclusive play equipment during play time which will increase physical activity. Other benefits for students will include improved physical, social and emotional development.

Expanding Resident Gardens

MSU Extension partnered with Alpine Haus Apartments to expand their shared garden for residents as a part of a policy, system and environmental (PSE) change effort.

A \$1500 SNAP-Ed PSE mini grant was used to purchase twelve EarthBoxes (a container gardening system), ergonomic tools and other garden materials for residents.


This initiative is expected to boost fruit and vegetable consumption among residents, encourage physical activity and strengthen community connections.

FORESTRY INNOVATION



Logging Professional Training

Alpine Center, December 13th & February 13 and hosted by MSUE U.P. Forestry Innovation Director, Jessie Randall.

Approximately 80 Loggers attended events to satisfy wood-procurement and harvesting requirements for SFI-certified wood purchasing companies in Michigan. Each company must accrue four hours per QLP (Qualified Logging Professionals) training each year. Core training consists of 8 hours of training covering topics such as, Fiber Sourcing Standards, MIOSHA Safety, Best Management Practices (BMP), Climate adaptation, Invasive species ID and Control.





Ice Storm Recovery Resources for Residents

The historic ice storm that hit northern Michigan in late March 2025 caused widespread tree damage - the "100 year" storm ravaged forests, residential areas and whole communities. MSU Extension responded with timely and relevant information and resources for food safety following natural disasters and what to do about tree damage. The questions from residents are still on-going and have included the following topics:

- Tree damage will our trees live or die?
- Forester help where can I get professional help?
- Logging practices how much is our timber worth?
- EFRP program how can I get help paying for clean up?
- Clean up rates how much can I charge for clean up?

MSU Extension works to improve farm personnel well-being and income, expand agriculture-related businesses and increase employment opportunities, making agriculture one of the strongest industries within Michigan. Supporting agriculture and helping to improve financial stability and competitiveness has a significant economic impact on Michigan and local communities.

100 Years of Soil Testing Services

MSU Extension partners with A&L Great Lakes, Inc. to analyze soil samples from the Home Lawn & Garden and Commercial/Farm soil test kits sold in county Extension offices; Extension staff then generate MSU-specific fertilizer and soil amendment recommendations. From January to December 2024, MSU Extension issued recommendations for 4,377 home lawn and garden samples—a 23% increase over 2023—and 1,819 commercial and farm samples, up 11%. Through this program, MSU Extension continues to deliver trusted soil testing services that Michigan residents and farmers have relied on for over a century.

Ask Extension and the Lawn and Garden Hotline

Michigan residents can receive expert, research-based answers to their questions through MSU Extension's online Ask Extension system. In 2024, Extension staff and trained Master Gardener volunteers responded to 6,179 questions from residents in 82 counties on topics ranging from gardening and landscaping to family, business and community. The Michigan Lawn and Garden Hotline provides additional statewide support via a toll-free number. In 2024, the hotline received 1,540 calls—a 6% increase from the previous year—with questions from residents in 80 of Michigan's 83 counties. Both services ensure residents have accessible, science-based guidance to support healthier gardens, homes and communities.
